Request for Quote Demolition and Removal of Units

General:

The Alachua County Housing Authority (ACHA) is looking for a contractor to demolish and remove two single story family units located at 13101 NW 154th Lane and 15404 NW Merrillwood Dr Alachua, Florida.

Scope of Work:

- 1. Completely remove two 4-bedroom 1.5-bath concrete block buildings of approximately 1,275 square feet each.
- 2. Removal shall include complete structure, foundation, driveway/parking area and utility feeds from the main supply trunks to the unit. Alachua County Housing Authority staff along with the City of Alachua will work with contractor on utilities.
 - a. Water lines are to be removed and secured at the meter with the meter remaining. (City of Alachua)
 - b. Electrical feed lines are to be removed to the pole. The pole will remain for now. (City of Alachua)
 - c. Sewar lines are to be removed to the connection point with the main line and caped. (City of Alachua)
 - There are old abandoned septic tanks behind the units. These are to be crushed and filled per code. (ACHA will provide approximate locations of these tanks)
 - ii. These units are currently on City of Alachua sewer service but have at least one old septic tank behind the unit
 - d. Gas meters and lines to be removed and secured. The gas company will remove once a contractor has been selected. (Davis Gas is the provided)
- 3. These units have non-friable asbestos mastic under the VCT tile floor that will need to be addressed in the process of demolition. (see attached picture)
 - a. Costs for any asbestos abatement will need to be included in your quote with the abetment company listed as a sub-contractor.
 - b. All pertinent information for the asbestos sub-contractor will need to be included with your quote
- 4. All debris to be removed and disposed of properly at dedicated landfills and/or recycle centers. Asbestos debris must be removed per state codes with a certification letter provided to ACHA at the completion of the abatement.
- 5. Site is to be secured at all times.
- 6. Grounds are to be free of any debris, divots, equipment trenches, etc. and leveled/seeded after completion of demolition.
- 7. All permits are the responsibility of the contractor.

- 8. Line locate is the responsibility of the contractor.
 - a. ACHA has access to sewer and septic tank plans.
- 9. Any salvageable material is the property of the contractor.
 - a. ACHA will remove major appliances, water heater and HVAC unit prior to start of demolition
























Insurance Requirements for Contractors

Contractor shall procure and maintain for the duration of the contract insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of or failure to perform the work hereunder by the Contractor, its agents, representatives, employees, or sub-contractors.

MINIMUM SCOPE OF INSURANCE

Coverage shall be at least as broad as:

- 1. Insurance Services Office Commercial General Liability coverage (occurrence form CG 0 01 10 01).
- 2. Insurance Services Office Additional Insured form (CG 20 37 or CG 20 26).
- 3. Insurance Services Office form number CA 00 01 06 92 covering Automobile Liability Code 1 (any auto), [require if scope of work includes driving on Authority property].
- 4. Workers' Compensation insurance as required by state law and Employer's Liability Insurance.
- 5. Builder's Risk insurance coverage for all risks of loss (in compliance with HUD guidelines).

MINIMUM LIMITS OF INSURANCE

Contractor shall maintain limits no less than:

 General Liability: \$1,000,000 per occurrence for Bodily Injury, Personal Injury, and Property Damage. If Commercial General Liability Insurance or other form with a general aggregate limit is used, either the general aggregate limit shall apply separately to the project/location or the general aggregate limit shall be twice the required occurrence limit.

NOTE: If this contract deals with hazardous materials or pollutants (i.e. lead based paint, asbestos, etc.) the Contractor shall carry Contractor's Pollution Liability insurance to cover the pollution exposures. The Authority shall be named as Additional Insured on the policy.

- 2. Automobile Liability: \$1,000,000 per accident for Bodily Injury and Property Damage.
- 3. Workers' Compensation (statutory) and Employer's Liability: \$1,000,000 per accident for Bodily Injury or Disease.
- 4. Builder's Risk: Completed value of the project.

NOTE: These limits can be attained by individual policies or by combining primary and umbrella policies.

DEDUCTIBLES AND SELF-INSURED RETENTIONS

Any deductibles or self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by the Authority. At the option of the Authority, either: the insurer shall reduce or eliminate such deductibles or self-insured retentions as respects the Authority, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers; or the Contractor shall provide a financial guarantee satisfactory to the Authority guaranteeing payment of losses and related investigations, claim administration, and defense expenses.

OTHER INSURANCE PROVISIONS

The General Liability and Automobile Liability policies are to contain, or be endorsed to contain, the following provisions:

- 1. The Authority, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers are to be covered as additional insured with respect to liability on behalf of the Contractor including materials, parts, or equipment furnished in connection with such work or operations and with respect to liability arising out of work or operations performed by the Contractor; or arising out of automobiles owned, leased, hired, or borrowed by or on behalf of the Contractor. General Liability coverage can be provided in the form of an appropriate endorsement to the Contractor's insurance or as a separate Owner's policy.
- 2. For any claims related to this contract, the Contractor's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects the Authority, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the Authority, its officers, officials, employees, or volunteers shall be excess of the Contractor's insurance.
- 3. Each insurance policy required by these specifications shall be endorsed to state that coverage shall not be cancelled or materially changed, except after thirty (30) days prior written notice by certified mail, return receipt requested, has been given to the Authority.
- 4. Maintenance of the proper insurance for the duration of the contract is a material element of the contract. Material changes in the required coverage or cancellation of the coverage shall constitute a material breach of the contract by the Contractor.

Builder's Risk policies shall contain the following provisions:

- 1. The Authority shall be named as loss payee.
- 2. The insurer shall waive all rights of subrogation against the Authority, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers.

ACCEPTABILITY OF INSURERS

Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current A. M. Best's rating of no less than B+:VI. Bidders must provide written verification of their insurer's rating.

VERIFICATION OF COVERAGE

Contractor shall furnish the Authority with original certificates and amendatory endorsements effecting coverage required by these specifications. The endorsements should conform fully to the requirements. All certificates and endorsements are to be received and approved by the Authority in sufficient time before work commences to permit Contractor to remedy any deficiencies. The Authority reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, including endorsements effecting the coverage required by these specifications at any time.

SUB-CONTRACTORS

Use of sub-contractors must be pre-approved by the Authority. Contractor shall include all sub-contractors as insureds under its policies or shall furnish separate insurance certificates and endorsements for each sub-contractor in a manner and in such time as to permit the Authority to approve them before sub-contractors' work begins. All coverages for sub-contractors shall be subject to all of the requirements stated above.

NOTE: If a subcontractor will be hired to perform hazardous material remediation, that sub-contractor will name the Authority, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers as additional insureds on its Pollution Liability insurance policy by endorsement. Such policy will provide coverage for the hazardous material work and other hazardous material operations.

NOTE: The General Contractor's Commercial General Liability insurance should not include CG 2294 or CG 2295 as these endorsements will eliminate the General Contractor's insurance coverage for its work where the damaged work or the work out of which the damage arises was performed by a subcontractor.

Legally Required Statement and Provisions Regarding Access to Records

The Parties acknowledge and agree that the statement and provisions below are required by Florida Statute to be included in this Agreement. The inclusion of this statement and provisions below shall not be construed to imply that the VENDOR has been delegated any governmental decision-making authority, governmental responsibility, or governmental function or that the VENDOR is acting on behalf of the ALACHUA COUNTY HOUSING AUTHORITY as provided under Section 119.011(2), Florida Statutes, or that the statement or provisions are otherwise applicable to the VENDOR. As stated below, the VENDOR may contact the ALACHUA COUNTY HOUSING AUTHORITY'S Custodian of Public Records with questions regarding the application of the Public Records Law; however, the VENDOR is advised to seek independent legal counsel as to its legal obligations. The ALACHUA COUNTY HOUSING AUTHORITY cannot provide the VENDOR advice regarding its legal rights or obligations.

IF THE VENDOR HAS QUESTIONS REGARDING THE APPLICATION OF CHAPTER 119, FLORIDA STATUTES, TO THE VENDOR'S DUTY TO PROVIDE PUBLIC RECORDS RELATING TO THIS AGREEMENT, CONTACT THE CUSTODIAN OF PUBLIC RECORDS AT:

If, under this Agreement, the VENDOR is providing services and is acting on behalf of the ALACHUA COUNTY HOUSING AUTHORITY as provided under Florida Statutes Section 119.011(2), the VENDOR shall comply with public records laws, and specifically shall comply with the following:

- i) Keep and maintain public records required by the ALACHUA COUNTY HOUSING AUTHORITY to perform the services.
- ii) Upon request from the ALACHUA COUNTY HOUSING AUTHORITY'S custodian of public records, provide the ALACHUA COUNTY HOUSING AUTHORITY with a copy of the requested records or allow the records to be inspected or copied within a reasonable time at a cost that does not exceed the cost provided in

Chapter 119 Florida Statutes or as otherwise provided by law.

- iii) Ensure that public records that are exempt or confidential and exempt from public records disclosure requirements are not disclosed except as authorized by law for the duration of the Agreement term and following completion of the Agreement if the VENDOR does not transfer the records to the ALACHUA COUNTY HOUSING AUTHORITY.

The PHA shall have exclusive ownership of, all proprietary interest in, and the right to full and exclusive possession of all information, materials, and documents discovered or produced by Contractor pursuant to the terms of this Contract, including, but not limited to, reports, memoranda or letters concerning the research and reporting tasks of the Contract.

Energy Efficiency. The Contractor shall comply with all mandatory standards and policies relating to energy efficiency which are contained in the energy conservation plan issued in compliance with the Energy Policy and Conservation Act (Pub.L. 94-163) for the State in which the work under this contract is performed.

Procurement of Recovered Materials

- (a) In accordance with Section 6002 of the Solid Waste Disposal Act, as amended by the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act, the Contractor shall procure items designated in guidelines of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) at 40 CFR Part 247 that contain the highest percentage of recovered materials practicable, consistent with maintaining a satisfactory level of competition. The Contractor shall procure items designated in the EPA guidelines that contain the highest percentage of recovered materials practicable unless the Contractor determines that such items: (1) are not reasonably available in a reasonable period of time; (2) fail to meet reasonable performance standards, which shall be determined on the basis of the guidelines of the National Institute of Standards and Technology, if applicable to the item; or (3) are only available at an unreasonable price.

with Federal appropriations and was with a Federal agency or a State agency or agency of a political subdivision of a State; and (ii) purchased a total of in excess of \$10,000 of the item both under and outside that contract.

Termination for Cause and for Convenience (contracts of \$10,000 or more).

- (a) The PHA may terminate this contract in whole, or from time to time in part, for the PHA's convenience or the failure of the Contractor to fulfill the contract obligations (cause/default). The PHA shall terminate by delivering to the Contractor a written Notice of Termination specifying the nature, extent, and effective date of the termination. Upon receipt of the notice, the Contractor shall: (1) immediately discontinue all services affected (unless the notice directs otherwise), and (2) deliver to the PHA all information, reports, papers, and other materials accumulated or generated in performing the contract, whether completed or in process.
- (b) If the termination is for the convenience of the PHA, the PHA shall be liable only for payment for services rendered before the effective date of the termination.
- (c) If the termination is due to the failure of the Contractor to fulfill its obligations under the contract (cause/default), the PHA may (1) require the Contractor to deliver to it, in the manner and to the extent directed by the PHA, any work described in the Notice of Termination; (2) take over the work and prosecute the same to completion by contract of otherwise, and the Contractor shall be liable for any additional cost incurred by the PHA; and (3) withhold any payments to the Contractor, for the purpose of set-off or partial payment, as the case may be, of amounts owned by the PHA by the Contractor. In the event of termination for cause/default, the PHA shall be liable to the Contractor for reasonable costs incurred by the Contractor before the effective date of the termination. Any dispute shall be decided by the Contracting Officer.

Applicability. The following contract clauses are applicable and must be inserted into small construction/development contracts, greater than \$2,000 but not more than \$250,000.

1. Definitions

Terms used in this form are the same as defined in form HUD-5370

2. Prohibition Against Liens

The Contractor is prohibited from placing a lien on the PHA's property. This prohibition shall apply to all subcontractors at any tier and all materials suppliers. The only liens on the PHA's property shall be the Declaration of Trust or other liens approved by HUD.

3. Disputes

- (a) Except for disputes arising under the Labor Standards clauses, all disputes arising under or relating to this contract, including any claims for damages for the alleged breach thereof which are not disposed of by agreement, shall be resolved under this clause.
- (b) All claims by the Contractor shall be made in writing and submitted to the Contracting Officer for a written decision. A claim by the PHA against the Contractor shall be subject to a written decision by the Contracting Officer.
- (c) The Contracting Officer shall, within 30 days after receipt of the request, decide the claim or notify the Contractor of the date by which the decision will be made.
- (d) The Contracting Officer's decision shall be final unless the Contractor (1) appeals in writing to a higher level in the PHA in accordance with the PHA's policy and procedures, (2) refers the appeal to an independent mediator or arbitrator, or (3) files suit in a court of competent jurisdiction. Such appeal must be made within 30 days after receipt of the Contracting Officer's decision.
- (e) The Contractor shall proceed diligently with performance of this contract, pending final resolution of any request for relief, claim, appeal, or action arising under or relating to the contract, and comply with any decision of the Contracting Officer.

4. Default

(a) If the Contractor refuses or fails to prosecute the work, or any separable part thereof, with the diligence that will insure its completion within the time specified in this contract, or any extension thereof, or fails to complete said work within this time, the Contracting Officer may, by written notice to the Contractor, terminate the right to proceed with the work (or separable part of the work) that has been delayed. In the event, the PHA may take over the work and complete it by contract or otherwise, and may take possession of and use any materials, equipment, and plant on the work site necessary for completing the work. The Contractor and its sureties shall be liable for any damage to the PHA resulting from the Contractor's refusal or failure to complete the work within the specified time, whether or not the Contractor's right to proceed with the work is terminated. This liability includes any increased costs incurred

- (b) The Contractor's right to proceed shall not be terminated or the Contractor charged with damages under this clause if—
 - (1)The delay in completing the work arises from unforeseeable causes beyond the control and without the fault or negligence of the Contractor; and
 - (2) The Contractor, within 10 days from the beginning of such delay notifies the Contracting Officer in writing of the causes of delay. The Contracting Officer shall ascertain the facts and the extent of the delay. If, in the judgment of the Contracting Officer, the findings of Fact warrant such action, time for completing the work shall be extended by written modification to the contract The findings of the Contracting Officer shall be reduced to a written decision which shall be subject to the provisions of the **Disputes** clause of this contract
- (c) If, after termination of the Contractor's right to proceed, it is determined that the Contractor was not in default, or that the delay was excusable, the rights and obligation of the parties will be the same as if the termination had been for convenience of the PHA.

5. Termination for Convenience

- (a) The Contracting Officer may terminate this contract in whole, or in part, whenever the Contracting Officer determines that such termination is in the best interest of the PHA. Any such termination shall be effected by delivery to the Contractor of a Notice of Termination specifying the extent to which the performance of the work under the contract is terminated, and the date upon which such termination becomes effective.
- (b) If the performance of the work is terminated, either in whole or in part, the PHA shall be liable to the Contractor for reasonable and proper costs resulting from such termination upon the receipt by the PHA of a properly presented claim setting out in detail: (1) the total cost of the work performed to date of termination less the total amount of contract payments made to the Contractor; (2) the cost (including reasonable profit) of settling and paying claims under subcontracts and material orders for work performed and materials and supplies delivered to the site, payment for which has not been made by the PHA to the Contractor or by the Contractor to the subcontractor or supplier; (3) the cost of preserving and protecting the work already performed until the PHA or assignee takes possession thereof or assumes responsibility therefore; (4) the actual or estimated cost of legal and accounting services reasonably necessary to prepare and present the termination claim to the PHA; and (5) an amount constituting a reasonable profit on the value of the work performed by the Contractor.
- (c) The Contracting Officer will act on the Contractor's claim within days (60 days unless otherwise indicated) of receipt of the Contractor's claim.
- (d)Any disputes with regard to this clause are expressly made subject to the provisions of the Disputes clause of this contract

6. Insurance

(a) Before commencing work, the Contractor and each subcontractor shall furnish the PHA with certificates of insurance showing the following insurance is in force and will insure all operations under the Contract. breakdowns by hours or unit costs (identified with specific work to be performed); Construction equipment exclusively necessary for the change; Costs of preparation and/or revision to shop drawings resulting from the change; Worker's Compensation and Public Liability Insurance; Employment taxes under FICA and FUTA; and, Bond Costs - when size of change warrants revision.

- (2)Indirect Costs. Indirect costs may include overhead, general and administrative expenses, and fringe benefits not normally treated as direct costs.
- (3)Profit. The amount of profit shall be negotiated and may vary according to the nature, extent, and complexity of the work required by the change.

(f)The allowability of the direct and indirect costs shall be determined in accordance with the Contract Cost Principles and Procedures for Commercial Firms in Part 31 of the Federal Acquisition Regulation (48 CFR 1-31), as implemented by HUD Handbook 2210.18, in effect on the date of this contract. The Contractor shall not be allowed a profit on the profit received by any subcontractor. Equitable adjustments for deleted work shall include a credit for profit and may include a credit for indirect costs. On proposals covering both increases and decreases in the amount of the contract, the application of indirect costs and profit shall be on the net-change in direct costs for the Contractor or subcontractor performing the work

- (g)The Contractor shall include in the proposal its request for time extension (if any), and shall include sufficient information and dates to demonstrate whether and to what extent the change will delay the completion of the contract in its entirety.
- (h) The Contracting Officer shall act on proposals within 30 days after their receipt, or notify the Contractor of the date when such action will be taken.
- (i) Failure to reach an agreement on any proposal shall be a dispute under the clause entitled Disputes herein. Nothing in this clause, however, shall excuse the Contractor from proceeding with the contract as changed.
- (j) Except in an emergency endangering life or property, no change shall be made by the Contractor without a prior order from the Contracting Officer.

(ii) Filing any complaint, initiating or causing to be initiated any proceeding or otherwise asserting or seeking to assert on

WARNING - TOXIC SUBSTANCES (ASBESTOS/PCB's) - Asbestos and polychlorinated biphenyl (PCB) were commonly used construction materials in buildings built prior to 1973 and 1977, respectively. Original Vinyl Composite Tile (VCT) was installed in units owned by the Alachua County Housing Authority (ACHA) and built between 1971 and 1984. A black mastic residue may remain on the concrete substrate. It is not known whether the mastic is an asbestos containing material or if it is asbestos-free as testing has not been performed on the units owned by the ACHA. THESE MATERIALS DO NOT PRESENT HEALTH HAZARDS AS LONG AS THEY ARE NOT RELEASED INTO THE AIR OR OTHERWISE DISTURBED. In the event a successful vendor encounters on-site material might be asbestos or polychlorinated biphenyl (PCB) which has not been rendered harmless, the successful vendor shall immediately stop work in the area affected and report the condition to the ACHA Maintenance Director Ron Hall at 352-372-2549. The work in the affected area shall not thereafter be resumed except by written agreement of the (ACHA) and contractor if in fact the material is asbestos or polychlorinated biphenyl (PCB) and has not been rendered harmless. The work in the affected area shall be resumed in the absence of asbestos or polychlorinated biphenyl (PCB) or when it has been rendered harmless. Successful contractor(s) is (are) responsible for the testing, handling and disposal, by legally prescribed methods, of any PCB's or PCB containing materials encountered in completion of specified work. If asbestos must be disturbed a vendor trained in the proper procedures must handle it in a prescribed manner. If successful contractor finds that his work, or any aspect of his work, will cause any disturbance of any material that might contain asbestos or PCB's, the successful contractor MUST PROCEED NO FURTHER and request an inspection and spot removal in the areas that might be affected. In accordance with Florida Statutes §725.06(2), this agreement requires Contractor to indemnify and hold harmless the Alachua County Housing Authority (ACHA) and its officers and employees, from liabilities, damages, losses and costs, including, but not limited to, reasonable attorney's fees, to the extent caused by the negligence, recklessness, or intentional wrongful misconduct of the Contractor and persons employed or utilized by the Contractor in the performance of the construction contract.

Contractor specifically agrees to save, indemnify, and hold harmless ACHA from any and all claims, losses and expenses (including reasonable attorney's fees), or liability to Contractor, any of the Contractor's contractors, subcontractors, sub-subcontractors, materialmen, or agents of any tier or their respective employees, in any liability, damage, loss, claim, action, or proceeding on account of damage of property or injury to or death of persons, caused in whole or in part by any act, omission, or default of ACHA or Contractor, accruing or resulting from any on-site toxic substances, including, but not limited to asbestos and polychlorinated biphenyl (PCB).

Such indemnification shall not include claims of, or damages resulting from, gross negligence, or willful, wanton or intentional misconduct of ACHA, its officers, directors, agents or employees, or for statutory violation or punitive damages, except and to the extent the statutory violation or punitive damages are caused by or result from the acts or omissions of the Contractor or any of the Contractor's contractors, subcontractors, sub-subcontractors, materialmen, or agents of any tier or their respective employees.

The monetary limitation on the extent of the indemnification provided to ACHA shall not be less than \$1 million per occurrence.

Illegal Immigration Reform and Enforcement Act of 2011 Compliance Requirements Effective July 1, 2011 E-Verify Applies to Certain ACHA Contracts

As a public employer, ACHA is mandated by Florida law to require its contractors and all of the contractor's subcontractors and sub-subcontractors engaging in the physical performance of services to register with E-Verify at the <u>U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Citizenship and Immigration Services website</u> and participate in the Federal Work Authorization Program in order to verify the employment eligibility of all newly hired employees.

E-Verify is a vitally important requirement of the <u>Illegal Immigration Reform and Enforcement Act of 2011</u> (the Act).

Before ACHA can consider a proposal from a contractor for the physical performance of services, the contractor must submit the E-Verify Affidavit posted by the Departments of Audits and Accounts or as approved by ACHA, containing the contractor's user-identification number and authorization date.

The contractor must affirm in the E-Verify Affidavit that it is registered with E-Verify, will continue to use E-Verify throughout the contract period, and will only contract with subcontractors and subcontractors of a subcontractor who have presented an E-Verify Affidavit affirming that they have done the same. The approved form of subcontractor's affidavit must contain the subcontractor's E-Verify user-identification number and the date the subcontractor was authorized to use the E-Verify system.

All contractors, subcontractors, and sub-subcontractors who have no employees and do not hire or intend to hire employees must adhere to the alternative documentation procedures set forth in the Act.

Contractors must maintain compliance records and provide a copy of each subcontractor's verification to ACHA when a subcontractor is retained in connection with the physical performance of services.

It is the responsibility of all contractors, subcontractors and sub-subcontractors engaging in the physical performance of services to comply with all E-Verify requirements.
